Counting the Omer and the Quarantine is Meaningful

Each year, on the second night of Passover, we begin the counting of the Omer. The Torah specifically instructs us to count seven complete weeks, from Passover to the holiday of Shavuot. It is a counting which begins with day 1 and continues through day 49 as we consciously count up (as opposed to counting down) to the experience of revelation at Mount Sinai

This year, when it came time for counting the Omer during our second seder, the Skolniks did two countings. We counted the Omer, but also did our "counting of the quarantine." Some of you might have seen us on Facebook on a daily basis as we count the days since our children have been to school. It has become a serious daily ritual for us and, I dare say, for those who watch our videos on a daily basis. As we each share something positive that has happened that day, we declare ourselves actively ready to fulfill the act of saving lives by staying home. We recite a blessing thanking God for answering us in times of crisis

and then count each day of the quarantine. May 1, the date of publication of this issue of the Forum, will be day 47.

Last week we passed the 40-day mark, which meant that we had been in this social isolation longer than Moses had been on Mount Sinai. In the coming days, we'll pass day 49, which will take us into higher numbers than the Omer has ever gone and will ever go. To be honest, there are moments when I find that to be depressing, as it has been so long since we've all been together in person. But, there are other moments when I am inspired by our communal perseverance, ability, and willingness to maintain these physical boundaries for the sake of saving lives. And, through it all, I remember each day of counting of the quarantine is also counting up toward a new normal for our congregation, our city, our state, our country, and our world. May we arrive at that new normal safely, speedily, and in good health.
