

# Shabbat Shalom D'var Torah

In this week's Torah portion, Vayikra, the Torah introduces us to the concept of a Karbon, animal offerings. Rabbi Samson Raphael Hirsch points out that there is no word that truly captures the essence of the concept of a Karbon. Some translate the word as a sacrifice, but in truth, sacrifice misses the mark. The term sacrifice implies the idea of giving up something of value for the purpose of benefiting G-d. This is not plausible because G-d does not have needs. The alternative translation commonly used is offering, which also fails to capture the essence of a karbon. Offering implies the need to appease G-d with an animal offering, which is not the true goal of a karbon.

The essence of a karbon is captured in the word karbon itself. The root of the word karbon is karov, which means to approach, to come near, and to come in close relationship with somebody. The purpose of a karbon when giving an animal offering is to bring the individual closer to G-d and to intensify and strengthen one's relationship with G-d.

We are living in unprecedented times with all of us trying to adapt to a new way of life, which we never could have imagined. The world around us is at a standstill. The sports and entertainment industries have come to a halt. Libraries and museums have shut their doors. The retail industry is limited to e-commerce. Yes, we might be overwhelmed with educating and entertaining our children who are homebound with us. However, we have an enormous opportunity to strengthen our relationships with our families and collectively with G-d. It is important to embrace these days as an opportunity to appreciate that time has stopped, so we now have a chance to have meaningful conversations with our children in the middle of the day. We now have time to learn a little more Torah or pray with a little more concentration. G-d willing everyone should stay healthy or recover soon. May we merit to grow as a community and seize the moment. Our children will thank us!
